Greetings to our Partners and Supporters!

As we progress through 2021, we are encouraged by the growth of our students and the continued development in relationships and partnership with various organisations. It has been a very busy season, and we are working hard, but we are seeing fruit.

A big feature of this year is the new Level 6 Diploma we are running – our first Bishopdale qualification in our own right (Level 6 is like the middle year of a degree.) There is a lot of work in getting all the paperwork and systems organised – our lecturers and admin staff have been managing to keep up. The programme is running really well and we are getting good feedback on the outcomes for students.

Core values for our College are at the heart of the way we designed this programme. We teach important theological skills, such as biblical studies, focused on skills in reading, understanding and teaching Scripture, and theology focused on Jesus Christ in His identity and work. At the same time, and all the way through, students are forced to reflect on what they are learning and connect it to the ministries they are involved in. Every student is in an internship placement. Learning about Jesus being the Lord who serves has to be connected up with our calling to serve and what 'Jesus-shaped' leadership looks like.

At the end of the day, the College exists to help the Church raise up and train leaders who are theologically and biblically trained and thoroughly 'sound' – but much more than that, we exists to help train people who are obedient to God, who lead the way Jesus did (and does). We seek to raise up leaders who have the maturity and selfawareness to be excellent leaders who are compassionate, strong, honest. We look for our approach to teaching and training to foster leaders who know how to lead in mission that looks like whanau, and not like a corporation.

So, thank you for being alongside us on the journey, and may the Lord bless every one of us.

Jessie Black, Bishopdale alumni.

Kia ora, I'm Jessie! I completed the Diploma in Christian Studies in 2019. I completed my studies from a distance, living and working in Wellington.



I had heard about the Bishopdale internship programme in 2018. I was going to be leading a missional community house (based around Victoria

University of Wellington students) the following year. I was discerning what my vocation was and felt that I wanted to try ministry to see if it was something God was calling me to. At the same time the Supervising Chaplain there was praying for more team members, so it felt like a real move of the Spirit that I ended up interning there.

Two years later and I am still at the chaplaincy as an associate chaplain. I help run the weekly chapel service, lead a contemplative prayer service, and am involved in our mission on campus, particularly through an art group that meets on a Thursday lunch time. I'm also responsible for pastoral care and discipleship for a number of students. I'm still involved in a missional community, living in a collection of four households of students, families and recent graduates that live our lives centred on prayer, study, and service.

Bishopdale was a springboard into learning how to be effective in my ministry. Most importantly, however, it taught me to trust God with more of my life, to seek revelation from Him, and to live out my life in worship to Him by loving others. My courses helped shape my thinking on important theological matters, and helped redeem study as both an academic discipline but also a way of embodied faith. The care that the tutors had for me in the whole of my life- and especially my personal faith journey- was so important for me to go into ministry, equipped for the journey ahead.

For the past 12 years I have really enjoyed my time being based at Bishopdale College with the staff, the students and being involved in ministry education across the Diocese. As I move up the hill to the Cathedral I look forwards to establishing a strong relationship between BTC and the Cathedral.
